Chamber Chatter

The Lancaster Chamber of Commerce, working with the local chambers, is preparing to launch a community-wide initiative entitled Think Local. SVCC proudly announces its partnership in this program.

The goal of **Think Local** is to stimulate the local economy by encouraging businesses and consumers to keep their dollars local. For the purposes of this program LCCI suggests a broad definition of "local". A "local" business is one that is located here, employees local people, pays local taxes, and contributes back to the local community. This means that a chain store could be included—but only its site in our area; internet sales through such a national chain would not qualify.

The **Think Local** campaign can have a significant impact on the local economy as those dollars re-circulate closer to home. Some benefits of the program include

- Keeping more money in the community
Money spent locally re-circulates back into the community helping to fund non-profit and community organizations.
- Helping to create and support jobs
Money spent locally increases business productivity and creates a better business climate – resulting in both more and sustained employment opportunities.
- Strengthening the community and its economy
The cycle of creating and spending wealth locally helps to strengthen the economy and the broader community.
- Improving the quality of life
Local business owners and their employees contribute financially and volunteer their time to support local organizations and charities.
- Developing enhanced customer service
When you buy products locally you are doing business with people you know – making any future services, repairs, or follow-up simple and convenient.

What is required to participate? First, interested businesses may opt into the program by signing a Declaration of Understanding and Support. This document will become available after the official launching of the program on October 14, 2011, when a press conference will be held. This press conference is slated for 9:30 am and will

be held at the Lancaster Convention Center as part of the LCCI Business Expo. The declaration designates you as a business who agrees to the core principles of the program bulleted above. After you sign, your business will be able to use the logo shown in your marketing campaigns. This logo may be personalized by placing your logo in the "O" of local or may be used in its generic form. Your business listing on the SVCC website will eventually include the exclamation point graphic which will link to another site listing other businesses who have agreed to participate in the **Think Local** campaign.

Once a business has signed on, they are encouraged to consider these points when purchasing products.

- Is the product I want to buy grown or manufactured here?
- Is it assembled, processed, and/or packaged here?
- Is it sold by a local company/business?
- Is the company community-minded, supportive of local causes and charitable or non-profit organizations?
- Does the company employ local workers?
- Do they pay local taxes?
- Do they and their employees volunteer or contribute back to the community?

“River Towns Guide” Announcements

Passport to River Towns Program

Last year, SVCC debuted the *Passport to River Towns* program. This program was designed to bring customers to area businesses during the winter months of January and February. In this program customers purchased a program passport which granted them special perks designed exclusively for this program. Passports went on sale and the end of 2010; the program ran from January 21 to February 12 of this year.

It is already time to plan this year's *Passport to River Towns* program. Slight modifications have been made to the program to increase the number of "travelers" who take part in this initiative. The basics of the program are outlined below.

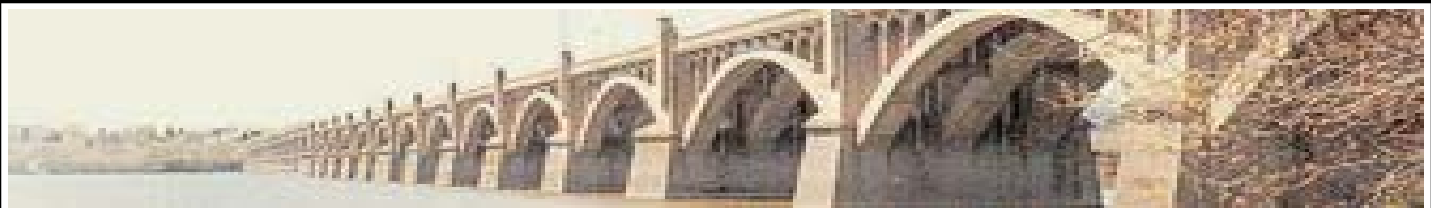
- Area businesses that choose to participate plan a special promotion for this event. These will vary from business to business. Some will have a set discount, some will have games to determine a discount, some will offer free merchandise or promotional materials, while still others will combine a benefit with a sale amount. Be creative. For ideas of some of the 2010 promotions, visit our website and check out the Passport to River Towns section under SVCC Events.
- Businesses choosing to participate need to notify SVCC on the attached form by **October 28, 2011**. Please be sure to remit a \$20 entry fee to help offset the cost of publicity.
- Participating businesses plan ahead for the promotion by ordering promotional items (if applicable) and by displaying signage provided by SVCC beginning in November and extending through the duration of the program. Participating businesses also send a JPEG or PDF file of their business logo to SVCC.
- SVCC markets the event. We will provide signage for you to display in

your business and will promote the event in the media.

- Passports go on sale at the Visitors Center for \$5 each beginning November 25. We hope to market this as a potential stocking stuffer. These will be printed passports will include an insert explaining the program benefit offered at participating venues. Participating business addresses and hours of operation will also be included in the insert.
- SVCC will produce labels with your logo. The labels will be used as "stamps" in the passports during the passport season to mark off a customer's participation.
- The *Passport to River Towns* program will run on weekends from January 20, 2012, to February 11, 2012. On those days guests will stop by your business, get their passport "stamped" by you, and enjoy the advertised benefit.
- Once a guest fills their passport, it may be turned into the Visitors Center to qualify for a grand prize drawing. This year's grand prize has not yet been determined; last year we gave away a Kindle with a \$100 gift card.

This year we are also asking participating businesses to assist with sales of the Passports at their individual businesses. This portion is optional, but will certainly help to raise the public's awareness of the program while making the Passports more accessible. Simply note on the form whether or not you wish to help with this portion of the event promotion.

If you are familiar with the Best Kept Secrets Tour, you will have an idea of how this promotion will work. Increase foot traffic in your business during January and February. 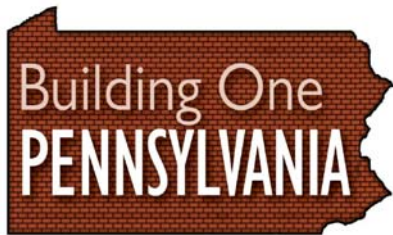

RTS uses the "Less is more" philosophy when designing for mobile use. This allows a faster

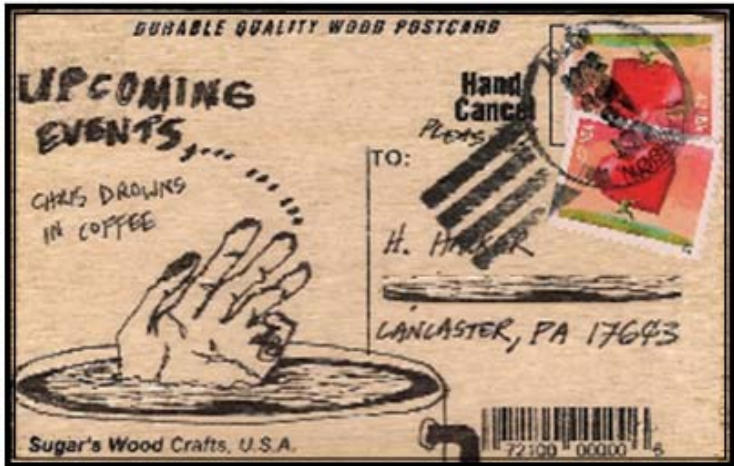

In general Mail Art operates within a spirit of anything goes. The collaborative project "Outpost" will follow the tradition of openness and we invite participants to send artwork to us sent via the postal service. The creativity is limited only by postal regulations.

The Mail Art

The term "Mail Art" was coined in the 1960s. Its main promoter was Ray Johnson who, with his New York Correspondence school, institutionalized the free exchange of postal messages between artists and between artist and audience. Mail art can take on many forms. Many of materials and techniques below have inspired individual and collaborative works.

Artist Unveils Fundraiser

Tom Hermansader announces the completion of his watercolor of the Elden Rettew Stadium located in Manheim, PA. Offset lithographs of the painting, *Friday Night Lights in Manheim*, are currently being sold as a fundraiser to help bring B.R.A.K.E.S. to Manheim Central High School. B.R.A.K.E.S. is an acronym for Be Responsible And Keep Everyone Safe. Their website is www.putonthebrakes.org. This organization is a group of professional drivers who train and educate teenage drivers and their parents about the importance of safe and responsible driving.

Manheim Central High School lost five students in automobile accidents in the past few months. On August 13, 2010, a Manheim Central High School student was killed when his car struck a house in Rapho Township. On January 16, 2011, a two-car crash claimed the lives of four Manheim Central High School students. They all played football for Manheim Central. Mike Williams has been the football coach at Manheim Central High School since 1981. His teams have won more than 300 games and a state championship, and along the way, he has become a local celebrity. At the boys' memorial service Coach Williams said, "Guys on the football team: Next season will be defined by wins and losses. But it will be defined by how we recover – I can assure you that how we recover will be remembered – People will say it will take a long time, but they don't know our heart."

Dr. Clayton Stitzel contacted Tom to create this painting of the stadium with one goal in mind - to prevent future tragedies. Without hesitation, Tom agreed to do the painting and felt honored to do so. As Dr. Stitzel says, "Manheim Central doesn't need another driver education program, they need help." On September 21, 2011 at 9:00 am, Tom conducted a group drawing and painting class at his gallery. On the same day at 1200 pm, framed prints of the stadium were presented to Dr. William Clark, Superintendent of Manheim Central School District, Mr. Seth H. Kensinger, representing the Manheim Central Student Council and Coach Mike Williams at Manheim Central High School. WGAL interviewed and taped at both locations.

On September 30, 2011, Fox 43 interviewed Dr. Stitzel and Tom Hermansader. Dr. Stitzel explained what Manheim Safety Driving Project is doing as a fundraiser. Tom talked about his involvement in the program and of course, the painting of the Manheim Stadium.
